PANMUNJOM BULLETIN

The United Nations command waited yesterday for Communist reaction to its call for a Korean armistice with or without the blessings of President Syngman Rhee.

In a letter delivered Monday at Panmunjom, General Clark told the Red high command it was "impossible" for him to recover the prisoners freed by South Korean guards on orders of Rhee.

However, he assured the Communist the Allies would make "every effort to obtain the co-operation of the government of the Republic of Korea" with the terms of the armistice.

General Clark's letter was in answer to Communist demands that the United Nations get Rhee in line and justify the prisoner release before a truce is signed.

General Clark flew back to Tokyo Monday afternoon with U.S. Army Chief of Staff Gen. J. Lawton Collins after personally taking the letter to the UN truce camp at Munsan.

Counter-attacking Chinese Communist smashed back ROK troops on the western front Monday to regain control of four key outposts protecting the invasion corridor to Seoul. The attacking force numbered about 6,000 men.

Although the ROKs were driven back on the western front, they had better luck to the east, where the ROK 3rd Division recaptured Lookout Mountain south of Capitol Hill after a five hour fight.

In the air, Sabre jets fought their first air battles in several days to shoot down six Communist MiGs.

ECONOMY CUT

The Army has cut a wide swath through a number of stateside installations and figures to come up with a saving in excess of \$11,750,000 during the first year of the closedown.

Five installations will be inactivated and two others are declared in excess of present needs.

To be shut down by January 1, 1954, are; Camp Breckenridge, Ky.; Camp Roberts and Camp San Luis Obispo, Calif., Camp Rucker, Ala., and Camp Atterbury, Ind., will be closed by June 30, 1954.

Ft. Crockett, Tex., and Ft. Adams, R. I., have been declared excess and will be closed by July 1, 1953.

Divisions now at the above stations are: 101st Airborne, Breckinridge; 7th Armored, Roberts; 47th Infantry, Rucker; and the 31st Infantry, Atterbury. They will be transferred or phased out.

San Luis Obispo is a Signal Corps Training Center and the home of a large radio school.

Reserve and National Guard units were trained at Ft. Crockett while Ft. Adams was the home of a small marine repair center for the Army.

All of the above stations will be placed on a standby basis with a small caretakers detachment. Proper measures will be taken to safeguard facilities at these installations for future needs.
