CLARK AND TOP F.E. 17th TOPS 32nd, 1-0 COMMANDERS CONFER

5TH STRAIGHT FOR BUFFS

Far Eastern Commander Gen. Mark Clark summoned his top military Commanders to Tokyo Tuesday for a top secret conference. Included in the top bracket conference was Eighth Army Commander Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, who was ordered from Korea. The reason for the top level talks at this time was not divulged by Clark's Headquarters.

The conference was to include General Taylor, Far East Air Force Commander General Weyland, who also returned from Korea Wednesday; Lt. Gen. Kendal, Deputy Commander AFEB, and Vice Admiral Bischoff, top Far East Naval Commander.

IN KOREA

American Sabre jet pilots with the biggest jet victory of the war behind them rode northward at dawn yesterday in search of more MIGs to conquer. The fighters took off at dawn while fighterbombers searched out targets deep in enemy territory. The days aerial activities began as night bombers returned from heavy strikes against Red vehicles, rail yards and front line positions.

Meanwhile, little action was reported on the ground except in the ROK held sectors. ROK Infantrymen reportedly took Lookout Mountain and fought furiously for Virginia Hill. Other ROK troops wrestled Red Chinese on the southern slopes of Finger Ridge in a desperate attempt to win back the commanding height.

"Buffalo" hurler Rudy Bunch completely dominated the situation Tuesday afternoon as he pitched brilliant ball to shut out the league leading Buccaneers, 1-0, and allowed only one hit. The victory was the Buffs' fifth straight and gave them a clean sweep of the 7th Division Baseball League.

A broken bat single to short center by the Bucs' leadoff man, John Slupczynski, in the top of the first inning was the only safety Bunch surrendered in his pitching masterpiece. In all there were only four hits in the contest, and none were involved in scoring the lone run of the game.

Bunch and Krabbenhoft, the Bucs' hurler, hooked up in a real pitchers duel that went right down to the wire. For eight and one half innings both clubs were stymied in the run column, but in the last of the ninth the break came. With one out in the last frame, Bunch received his second walk. Bunch's battery mate, John Rodman, was retired on an infield roller with Bunch advancing to second. A snap throw from first to second in an attempt to nail Bunch went over the second baseman's head, out into left field and through the left fielder's legs. The speedy Bunch raced around on the play to score standing up and to win his own ball game.

Rudy Bunch's pitching performance has been heralded as the finest turned in this season in the league.
