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RHEE REJECTS APPEAL MOBILE P.X. EXCHANGE

South Korean President Syngman Rhee has rejected UN appeal to seek a peaceful unification of Korea. The announcement came from South Korea's Foreign Minister Pyun Yung Tae, who late Wednesday night told a reporter, "the President has despaired of any peaceful solution to the Korean question. He believes nothing but military means can bring about the unification of Korea." But Pyun added: "Whether the position is final or not, that is our present position." Pyun said that Rhee's rejection of the UN appeal was contained in a new letter sent to Assistant Secretary of State Walter Robertson late Thursday. Pyun revealed that no further meeting between Robertson and Rhee has been set. He said he thought each side would stand firm on its present positions, and predicted that "each will go separate ways."

Two Mobile Post Exchange Buses laden with all kinds of trinkets and souvenirs are now combing the 7th Division "Bayonet" area in quest of relic hunters. Among many articles aboard are men's and boy's jackets, ladies pajamas, clocks silverware, Japanese dolls and fishing tackle. One of the buses covers the 17th, 31st and 32nd regiments while the other supplies the remaining regions of the Bayonet Division.

According to a couple of Martins, Martin J. McGrath and Martin J. Cappon, proprietors of one of the P.X. Buses, the idea of furnishing the troops with souvenirs, instead of the men traveling to Japan for them, has proven to be a very popular service. The two men stressed that prices of the mobile exchange are the same, if not cheaper, than any P.X. in Japan. "In fact," added Cappon, "some G.I.'s have even given up R&R because the stuffs cheaper here."

They pointed out that the articles selected by the men are dispatched to their destinations from Yokahama, Japan and not from the bus' P.X. show case. "We only take orders for the goods and are concerned with the mailing end of it," declared McGrath. "Our central P.X. exchange in Japan does the rest."

McGrath then went on to explain that an airmail delivery costs 80¢ per pound and that the price of mailing parcel post packages depended on the size of the bundle. He said however, that the U.S., Alaska and Puerto Rico were the only places where gifts could be sent.

Another salient feature of the success of these mobile post exchange buses is the certification by McGrath and Cappon, that all goods purchased would be delivered safely and soundly to (continued on page #2 column #2)
