



## RAIN CUTS FIGHTING TO FEW PROBES

A driving rain turned the Korean front into a quagmire Sunday as ground action dwindled and UN troops fought to keep their bunkers from caving in.

The heaviest fighting was reported south of Virginia Hill on the eastern front where two Red companies -- about 300 men-- assaulted 7th ROK Division troops.

The South Korean defenders killed or wounded 100 Chinese Reds in beating off the attacks, despite a Communist shell barrage of some 4,000 rounds.

Allied troops manning an out post on Sniper Ridge in the central sector killed or wounded 87 Reds who threw three light probes against the position.

While UN foot-soldiers slushed in ankle deep mud, 19 B-26 invaders unloaded 38 tons of high explosives on Red positions at the front.

President Syngman Rhee and U.S. envoy Walter Robertson were expected to confer again yesterday. For 10 days, Robertson has been seeking to win the aging Korean's chiefs backing on a truce to halt the war. Rhee told a press correspondent Sunday, "I am trying to clear up misunderstandings."

The top American military Commander in Korea declares he is confident he will be able to move UN troops out of the firing line safely if the Republic of Korea decides finally to go on fighting despite an armistice.

Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, Eighth Army Commander, says he is certain that any break between the ROKs and the UN command will be a friendly one.

## FLYING BUFFALO
