REDS-UN MEET PIGSKIN STARS

Communists today may answer Gen. Mark W. Clark's request that they sign an Armistice now with or without the South Koreans.

The Reds Tuesday night asked for the liaison officers to meet at noon Wednesday at Panmunjom.

The only pending business is General Clark's letter of June 29th in which he asked the Communist high command to set a date for signing the armistice as it was negotiated.

He said his government would make every effort to persuade the South Korean Government to co-operate with the armistice terms.

In Seoul Tuesday, assistant Secretary of State Walter Robertson was expected to resume his talks with President Syngman Rhee.

IN KOREA

American infantrymen jumped off Tuesday night in a counter-attack against 1500 Chinese Reds holding the west slope of Pork Chop outpost on the western front.

Soldiers of the 7th Infantry Division re-won the eastern slope in a bitter hand-to-hand bayonet and hand grenade fight. Torrential rains which had turned the battle field into a swamp of mud ended in the early afternoon.

Fifth Air Force war planes, taking advantage of the first break in the weather in several days, pounded the Reds in close support strikes.

If the members of the Personnel Section, Headquarters Company of the 17th Infantry Regimental Command Post ever decided to organize a football team this fall session, they'd have a tremendous advantage over the other sections in the Regiment, because defending their goal line would be PFC Robert D. Corrick and Cpl. Leon S. Malone Jr. Both are former collegiate pigskin stars; Corrick a defensive left halfback from Drake University, and Malone a defensive right end from Yale University. Below is a summary of some of the highlights of their gridiron days.

The 23-year-old Corrick, a physical instructor, has been playing organized football ever since his high school days, where he excelled as an All-State fullback. Upon graduation he enrolled at Drake University where he promptly took over the varsity halfback slot.

Leon Malone also began his turf days in high school before continuing into the collegiate ranks as a defensive right end under coach Herman Hickman.

The stocky, well built Corrick went on to praise many of the stars that he knew and played with in college. Among others, Corrick acclaimed Drake's famous All-American negro halfback Johnny Bright, who led the Nation for two consecutive years in total ground (continued on page #2-column #2)

yardage gained. "He would have copped honors a third time," he commented, "but a serious leg injury hampered his running."

Malone lauded teammate Levi Jackson, and stressed that Jackson was Yale's first Negro football captain in 200 years. "That fella Levi could run 100 yards in 9.8 seconds flat," he added, and was a great passer and broken field runner."

Listed among Corrick's toughest opponents on the gridiron are Tulsa University's speedy half-back J.R. Boone, now with the professional Chicago Bears of the National Football League, and Jim Nutter, star back from Wichita.

Both men expressed their fervent desire to play on some Army team in the fall.
