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PANMUNJOM BULLETIN DOUGH FOR A COOK

The Associated Press reports that Allied and Communist truce delegates met for 12 minutes at Panmunjom yesterday morning and then recessed for a half hour. The Reds delivered a letter accusing the Allies of bombing and strafing a prisoner of war collecting point north of Pyongyang on July 10th. The delegates resumed their meeting at 11:42 a.m. and recessed their second meeting at 12:12 p.m. until 11 a.m. today. The Allied spokesman declined to say which side requested the 30 minute recess.

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Allied troops Monday threw Communist infantrymen off positions south-east of P'yongyang on the central front, winning back positions lost Sunday in a 1,000 man attack by the Red Chinese.

The Eighth Army troops counter-attacked at 2:05 yesterday morning engaging about 200 enemy on the position and after two and one half hours the Chinese broke contact and Allied forces were left in control of the ground. On the west-central front the enemy made two unsuccessful attacks on two Allied outposts.

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A Washington dispatch from United Press yesterday quoted Senator William F. Knowland as saying that only nations who have fought in Korea should be permitted to attend the Korean peace conference. The acting Senate Republican leader was immediately supported by Democratic Senator Mike Mansfield, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Mansfield reportedly said that Communist China should be present at the treaty writing even if the Beijing government never has admitted formal participation in the war.

One of the most grateful soldiers in Korea today, is Cpl. Joseph Cross, Service Company, of the 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment. Cpl. Cross is thankful because the fellows in his company helped him out of a deep rut.

"You see," explained, Sgt. Ralph Suther, "Joe Cross our First Cook, owed over \$1,200 in debts, back in the States, and had no immediate way to raise the funds."

Sgt. Suther told of all the bad luck that had plagued Cross' wife and two children. He said that the Corporal's wife was in the hospital having a third child, while the other two children were laid up with influenza. The Sergeant added that he never knew of anyone, who had such misfortune, as Corporal Cross.

Suther then stressed how all the MCC's got together and decided to come to Cross' rescue by trying to raise some money for him. The Sergeants voted to take up a collection amongst the GI's in the Service Company and see if they could aid him in any way. "And we emphasized at the meeting, that all donations made by the men would be strictly of the voluntary nature," he commented.

So what happened? When pay day finally rolled around, a collection was taken and to the surprise of all... \$400.00 was polled by the members of Service Company. "Our boys really did a charitable deed, by raising that much," Suther concluded, "and gave our First Cook new hope and a chance to smile again."
