Allied troops Monday threw Communist infentrymen off positions south-east of P'yonggang on the centrel-front, winning back positions lost Sunday in a 1,000 man attack by the Red Chinese.

The Highth Army troops counter-attacked at 2:05 yesterday morning engaging about 200 enemy on the position and after two and one half hours the Chinese broke contact and Allied forces were left in control of the ground. On the west-central front the enemy made two unseccessful attacks on two Allied outposts.

A Washington dispatch from United Pressyssterday quoted Senator William F.Knowland as saying that only nations who have fought in Kores should be permitted attend the Korean paace conference.
