## WORLD NEWS 17th TRAINING CENTER

The Chinese Communists attacked Tuesday night with 41,000 men across 18 miles of the east-central front in one of the greatest battles of the Korean war. Hand-to-hand fighting and local penetrations were reported almost immediately. Some were contained. The battle was by far the biggest since the Reds launched their last great offensive in May, 1951. It was at least twice as heavy as the Imjin-gang River battle last month.

By 4 a.m. the battle appeared as a major thrust, but still a limited Communist offensive.

The new battle dwarfed any action the front has seen since the truce talks began two years ago.

Tension in the middle east was heightened yesterday by a new dispute between Britain and Egypt. Machine gun equipped British troops sealed off roads leading into the Suez Canal zone when Egypt refused to return a missing RAF flyer. Egypt proclaimed a state of emergency and both British and Egyptian cabinets met over the situation.

U.S. Ambassador Jefferson Caffery talked with both sides to try to calm tempers. British and Egyptian troops faced each other in the administrative area in the Canal zone.

Despite the angry Kremlin rejections, shipments of the food President Eisenhower offered the hungry East-Germans are on the way to Europe. An American official in West Berlin hoped that they can deliver it despite Red refusals of the offer.

SFC Sylvester Carey is one of the main reasons why the men of the 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment are thoroughly trained when they arrive at their respective units. SFC Carey is in charge of the training center, where the newly assigned Buffaloes are given a refresher course, in the fundamentals of military warfare. Carey is an experienced teacher and is very adept in handling his men.

The seasoned veteran of WWII said that he has been training troops for the past six years. He was a First Sergeant at Camp Roberts, California, with the 31st AAA where he ran seven consecutive cycles through. "I like to train the troops," he declared, "it gives me great satisfaction to know that I'm getting so many ready to defend their country."

When asked how long he had been at the training center the well trained Carey said only a few months. "You see," he smiled, "in April I was also given a chance to test myself with 'A' Company of the 17th Regiment. The 31-year old vet recounted how his company counterattacked a hill and secured it from the Chinese who had taken it 12 hours previous. "It took a whole day to wipe em off the hill," he added, "we finally had to use flamethrowers."

SFC Carey went on to explain the basic fundamentals that are taught during the five day training program. Courses mentioned were; machine gun, BAR, and rifle drill, the technique of throwing hand grenades, stringing of barbed wire, instruction on building prefabricated bunkers, training on mines and booby traps, CBR warfare, squad tactics and a question and answer period given to familiarize the men with any (continued on page #2 column #2)
