RED ATTACKS REPELLED

Chinese Communists hurled desperation attacks at the western end of the central front bulge yesterday in a futile attempt to stall or divert the Allied offensive grinding northward in its second day.

Remanence of a 12 thousand man Communist force that slammed into a UN Division Thursday night came back before dawn in new punches at two Allied outposts.

Both attacks broke against a hail of steel laid down by artillery, mortars and machine guns.

United Press reported from the western most "Hinge" sector that an Allied Division guarding the mouth of the Kumhwa valley with-drew from exposed outposts after "cutting an enemy division to bits with artillery fire."

The two new attacks sent 700 Reds against the "Hinge" at two a.m. and another 700 into an outpost called "Boomerang." Both failed.

Navy Lt. Guy Bordelon claimed his fifth Communist plane yesterday to become the first night ace of the Korean War.

The claim came last night as a Red "bed check Charlie" made a raid over Allied installations.

Associated Press reports that Gen. Mark W. Clark visited his chief truce negotiator yesterday morning. A UN spokesman said General Clark reached advanced truce Headquarters at Munsan about 8:40 a.m. No details of his visit with Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison have been released. The truce talks were in recess yesterday, but they will resume at 2p.m. today.

Asst. Sec. of State Walter S. Robertson returned to Washington Thursday and said as a result of his talks with President Syngman Rhee a truce can now be signed if the Reds want one.

257 BUFFALOGES RECEIVE AWARDS

In four separate ceremonies on July 14th, Major Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau presented 257 awards to men in the units of the 17th Infantry "Buffalo" Regiment for heroism during recent action.

Under threatening skies, with now and then some rain in the air, General Trudeau visited the Buffalo Tank Company and the first, second and third battalions. The officers and men of the regiment received 20 Silver Stars and 237 Bronze Stars for Valor.

In addressing those men who had received awards and the honor guards from each company, the General stressed the point that the awards he had just presented were a tribute to the leadership and devotion to duty of the men. He noted that these decorations were tangible evidence of heroism, and that the Buffalo Regiment and the 7th Division had much to be proud of in the way that the 17th had fulfilled its mission.

While praising those who were there to receive their awards, General Trudeau acknowledged the debt all of us owe to those wounded and killed in the service of their country in the difficult completion of the operation.

In concluding his address General Trudeau said, "individually, by squads, platoons, companies and battalions, I congratulate you; I salute you."
