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UN STABILIZES NEW LINE ON CENTRAL FRONT

The Commander of the Nations Eighth Army in Korea said yesterday that the UN ground forces have stabilized a new line on Korea's central front. The forces set up the line efter halting an offensive by 10 Chinese divisions totaling some D. 80,000 troops. Gen. Maxwell Taylor said his troops on the east-central sector have estabof lished themselves at the base the Kumson Bulge. Much of that was over-run by the Reds in what General Taylor called first resumption of open warfare in nearly two years.

allied planes destroyed eight Russian - built Red tanks moving toward the bettleline and U.S. Sabre jets damaged two more Red MIGs over northwest Korea.

As a prelude to Saturday's important Allied-Communist truce meeting at Panmunjom at 2 p.m. Gen. Mark W. Clerk confered yesterday with Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison, Chief UN delegate, for three hours. The United Nations supreme commander then flew back to Tokyo after his two day visit to Seoul. He had conferred with South Korean President Syngman Rhee during his stay.

MORTAR UNIT SERVES 1,000 DAYS ON LINE

July 18th marked one thouse and days on the line for a unit in the 17th Infantry Buffalo Regiment. The Buffalo Heavy Mortar Company joined the ranks of those who have served more than 1,000 days on the line here in Korea.

The event is unusual because the Mortar Company is a four-point unit, and serves sometimes in front of the MIR. Heserve time at the Hwachon Reservoir area and Koje-do are the only time the company hasn't been on the line. Although most units spend some time in reserve, the Buffalo mortarmen have spent their "reserve" time in supporting other units.

In spending so much time in the four-point zone, the company is one of the few who have been rotating men with nine months service over here.


In this length of line service, the unit has supported the 17th in many of their famous battles in the Korean campaign. The Mortar Company went with the Regiment to the Yalu and back, and fought at Bloody Baldy, the Punchbowl, Zebra, Charlie O.P., Triangle Hill, and the times they have spent days on end moving up to the MIR after nightfall to support Buffalo patrols.

An interesting sidelight is the fact that the Heavy Mortar Company has served on every sector of the battleline since the beginning of this year.
