ALLIED AIR POWER HALTS RED OFFENSIVE

UN dive-bombers poured flaming napalm on Chinese Communist troops at dawn yesterday, and South Korean footsoldiers charged close behind the air attack in their central front counter-offensive.

The ROKs gave up a hill around 1:15 a.m., but heavy fighting continued in the area until dawn, when part of an enemy regiment began withdrawing under Allied air attack.

Waves of Allied bombers swooped low over the enemy troops and blasted them with bombs, flaming napalm and rockets. And American Sabre jet pilots, flying cover for the bombers, shot down two MIGs for a total of 17 in six days of air combat.

Meanwhile, Corps Headquarters reported, "spectacular gains" by one flank of the Allied drive late Saturday and early Sunday.

7 ARMY RTCs TO CLOSE BY 1954

Economy is again the byword as the Army announces that seven of its replacement training centers will be shut down or consolidated by January 1, 1954.

RTCs at Camp San Luis Obispo, Calif. (Signal Corps); Ft. Lee, Va. (Quartermaster Corps); Ft. McClellan, Ala. (Chemical Corps); Ft. Eustis, Va. (Transportation Corps); Ft. Belvoir, Va. (Corps of Engineers); Ft. Sill, Okla. (Field Artillery); and Camp Gordon, Ga. (Signal and Military Police Corps) will close.

Army spokesmen emphasize that in all cases, with the exception of San Luis Obispo, it is only the RTC being shut down—not the installation itself. Camp San Luis Obispo will be inactivated as of January 1, 1954.

Personnel who might formerly have been assigned to the above branches will receive eight weeks basic combat training in training divisions. Further instruction in MOS will then be conducted at branch schools or in units at branch centers.

The seven remaining training divisions will be the 3rd Armored Ft. Knox, Ky.; 5th Armored, Camp Chaffee, Ark.; 6th Armored, Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo.; 6th Infantry, Ft. Ord, Calif.; 8th Infantry, Ft. Jackson, S.C.; 9th Infantry, Ft. Dix, N.J.; and 10th Infantry, Ft. Riley, Kan.

The four replacement training centers in the continental U.S. which will remain open after inactivation and consolidation of the others, include Antiaircraft Artillery, Ft. Bliss, Tex.; Ordnance Corps, Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Md.; Medical Corps, Camp Pickett, Va.; and Basic RTC, Camp Gordon, Ga.
