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## WORLD NEWS ROUNDUP

### PANMUNJOM BULLETIN

Preparations for a Korean armistice moved into high gear Monday as lower level Allied and Communist officers chalked up their busiest day since the truce talks started.

While members of the 4-nation armistice supervisory commission waited in Tokyo and Peiping respectively, Allied and Communist staff officers doing the spade work scheduled further meetings at Panmunjom for Tuesday morning.

In rapid succession, these were the developments that heralded an early signing of the Korean armistice:

1. Junior members of the military armistice commission met for the first time Monday with their Communist counterparts.

2. Two groups of staff officers held five meetings, and were scheduled to carry on Tuesday.

3. Senior Liaison officers met twice.

4. Interpreters met twice to translate into English, Chinese and Korean the decisions being reached in other meetings.

5. Communist soldier and civilian laborers and carpenters resumed erection of a house presumed to be for the armistice signing at Panmunjom.

6. Peiping radio announced the arrival in the Chinese capital of Polish and Czech members of a supervisory supervision committee with their staffs. Swiss and Swedish groups already were in Tokyo.

7. Eighth Army Commander Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor flew to the Munsan base camp for conferences with the UNC chief delegate, Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison, about military aspects of the truce.

### OPERATIONAL SUMMARY

A brooding silence settled over the Korean front last night.

Early reports from the front showed little action and that was on the Kumsong front.

Air Force fighter-bombers dropped 250 tons of bombs on the Berlin sector and the Kumsong front.

Sabre jets patrolled the skies north up to the Yalu, but found no MIGs.

### FOOD FOR EAST GERMANS

Thousands of hungry East Germans from the Communist held East zone lined up for milk and fruit under a food plan where-by special certificates purchased groceries at reduced prices. In doing this they defied Communist threat.

President Eisenhower today promised the West German government food supplies for emergency relief in the Soviet occupied East zone, despite Russia's refusal to let them pass through the Iron Curtain.

### J. B. MATHEWS TO TESTIFY

The House Un-American Activities Committee voted yesterday to call J. B. Mathews to testify on his charge that "a Protestant Clergyman formed the largest single group" of pro Communist in the United States.

No date was set for Mathews appearance.

### CUSTOM AGENTS SEIZE OPIUM

Singapore customs men seized 2,000 pounds of opium hidden in a truck which they chased from the East coast of the Island to the out-skirts of the city.

Value of the opium was estimated at more than 360,000 U.S. dollars.
