Stubborn enemy resistance continued in the area east of Yonchon and north northwest of Yonggongini where the enemy continues to fight a delaying action as allied forces continue to advance. Light resistance was encountered on the central front. Some light to stubborn resistance was reported east of Yanggu and west northwest of Inje. The enemy again attempted to create a smoke screen during Monday, however, prevailing winds tended to eliminate the persistency of the smoke permitting UN aircraft to remain operational.

COMMUNIST MEMORIAL FOUND

Miles of catacombs and a monument erected for Joseph Stalin and North Korean Premier Kim Il Sung awaited Infantrymen of the 3rd Battalion when they crashed through the gates of Yanggu.

Looted a few miles east of Hwachon Reservoir, the city had nothing but charred remains and a few crumbled walls as the "Buffaloes" moved through.

In the center of town a small marble pillar stood in memorial to the town's "liberation" from the Japanese by the Russians. It was erected in 1945.

The names of Joseph Stalin, and North Korea's number one Red, Kim Il Sung, were inscribed in Korean on one side of the monument.

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DULLES REASSURES PEACE PROPOSAL PROGRAM

Ambassador John Foster Dulles said yesterday General Douglas MacArthur's policies in Japan, including completion of an early and just peace, "are and will remain the policies," of the United States. Dulles assured the Japanese people that progress has been made during the month since his peace mission left Japan after discussing terms of the treaty with MacArthur and Japanese leaders. "Now" Dulles said, "we shall discuss with General Ridgway and the Japanese leaders the good progress already made and the program for the days that lie between us and the great goal of peace and justice we seek together," Dulles added, "Our peace mission returned to Japan on a day saddened by the departure of General MacArthur," but he added, "Lt. General Matthew B. Ridgway who replaced him is one of America's outstanding leaders who possesses moral quality, vision, and unquenchable love of freedom. Which will assure that the supreme command for the allied powers will continue in its high tradition."
