HERD FIRE TO HOSTILE HORDES

THE COMMUNISTS FAILED THURSDAY NIGHT IN A MAJOR ATTEMPT TO

BREACH THE UNITED NATIONS LINE ON THE EASTERN FRONT.

ELEVEN HUNDRED CHINESE REDS ATTACKED ALLIED POSITIONS IN THE DARK, SHADOWY MUNDUNG-NI VALLEY. IN A 49 MINUTE PITCHED BATTLE ALLIED TROOPS TURNED BACK THE ATTACK AND INFLICTED APPARENTLY HEAVY CASUALTIES.

REDS PICK RUSSIA AS TRUCE INSPECTOR

ALLIED TRUCE NEGOTIATORS
STOOD PAT YESTERDAY ON THEIR VETO.
OF RUSSIA AS A NEUTRAL TRUCE INSPECTOR. THE REDS HAVE NAMED RUSSIA, CZECHOSLOVAKIA AND POLAND AS
THEIR CHOICES ON THE JOINT NEUTRAL
INSPECTION TEAMS. THE UNC ACCEPTED
THE CHOICE OF CZECH AND POLISH
REPRESENTATIVES FOR THE POSTARMISTICE INSPECTION TEAMS, BUT
REJECTED RUSSIA FOR OBVIOUS REASONS.

THE UN APPEARS TO BE WILLING TO ACCEPT THE NEW RED PROPOSALS ON ITEM FIVE AND FOR A POST-ARMISTICE PEACE CONFERENCE, IF THE REDS AGREE TO UN INTERPRETATION OF THEIR PROPOSALS. THE PROPOSALS APPEAR TO ELIMINATE MANY STUMB-LING BLOCKS ON THE ROAD TO AGREE-UENT ON ITEM FIVE.

SATURDAY US NAVAL FORCES IN KO-REAN WATERS BEGAN THEIR SECOND YEAR OF DAILY BOMBARDMENT AGAINST THE COMMUNIST PORT OF WONSAN.

WARSHIPS, MOST OF THEM AMERICAN, BEGAN A BIRTHDAY BOMBARD-MENT SATURDAY MORNING. THE MEIGE OF WONSAN IS THE LONGEST EVER PARTICIPATED IN BY AMERICAN NAVAL UNITS....

SEVEN ALLIED RAIDING PARTIES MADE
HIT AND RUN ATTACKS IN WESTERN
KOREA SATURDAY WHILE UN ARTILLERY
POUNDED THE ENEMY. ALL SEVEN RAIDING PARTIES ENCOUNTERED OPPOSITION.
ONE TANK-INFANTRY TEAM REPORTED
RECEIVING 1COC. ROUNDS OF ARTILLERY
AND MORTAR FIRE IN A 20 MINUTE
FIREFIGHT:

AN ALLIED OFFICER SAID AN ASSAULT IN SUCH STRENGTH COULD ONLY
MEAN THE COMMUNISTS WERE ATTEMPTING
TO DRIVE A WEDGE DOWN THE LONG AND
NARROW VALLEY, PAST UN STRONGHOLDS
ON EITHER SIDE, THE REDS MADE ONLY
ONE ATTEMPT, HE SAIP, BECAUSE OF
THE SEVERE CASUALTIES THEY SUFFERED.

THIS CORRESPONDENT WATCHED
FROM A HILL 200 YARDS AWAY AS THE
COMMUNISTS APPROACHED UN POSITIONS;
WERE MET BY WITHERING FIRE; AND
FINALLY RETREATED UNDER COVER OF
SMOKE SHELLS.

SMOKE SHELLS.

THE FIREFIGHT WAS JUST WEST OF HEAFTBREAK RIDGE AND IN THE SHADOWS OF CINET TALL, SNOW-COVERED MOUNTAINS WEST IF THE MUNDUNG-NI: VALLEY.

DESPITE THE MOONLESS SKY, UN TROOPS WERE ABLE TO SEE THE COMMUNISTS APPROACHING THEIR POSITIONS FROM TWO ENEMY HELD HILLS, ONE ON EACH SIDE OF THE VALLEY. THE UN INFANTRYMEN HELD THEIR FIRE WHILE THE REDS CREPT ACROSS A THIN LAYE OF SNOW ON THE VALLEY FLOOR.

ABOUT 600 REDS ADVANCED DE UN POSITIONS ON THE VALLEY FLOOR. SEVERAL GROUPS OF 100 TO 200 ENEMY TURNED TOWARD THE EAST AND WEST, WHERE OTHER UN INFANTRYMEN WAITED IN THE HILLS BORDERING THE VALLEY.

SOME OF THE REDS MANAGED TO CUT TIE FIRST BARBED WIRE DEFENSES SURFINDING THE ALLIED VALLEY POSI-

THEN THE ALLIES OPENED UP WITH THEIR TREMENDOUS FIREPOWER. "BUFFA-LOSS" MEAREST THE REDS HURLED HAND GRENADES, MACHINEGUNS CHOPPED DOWN OTHER CHINESE, UN RIFLEMEN AIMED AND FIRED. ALLIED MORTAR AND ARTILLERY PIECES SHOWERED THE AREA IN FRONT OF THE UN POSITIONS WITH SCHRAPNEL, TANKS BOLLED OUT INTO (CONTINUED PAGE TWO).

SIX COMMUNIST MORTAR SHELLS HIT THE HILL WERE I WAS. THEN THE REDS FIRED SMOKE SHELLS INTO THE VALLEY, SCREENING THE BROWN FROM SIGHT. THE FIRING DW INDLED OFF UNTIL THERE WAS ONLY THE SOUND OF AN OCCASIONAL ARTILLERY ROUND. UNDER THE COVER OF THE SMOKE, THE REDS WITHDREW OUT OF THE VALLEY AS ALLIED ARTILLERY CONTINUED HARASSIMG FIRE.
