Ground action along the 155-mile battlefront dropped to a near halt Tuesday. Only scattered patrol actions were fought against small enemy groups along the front.

Allied fighter-bombers were bampered in their continuous pounding of possible Red build up areas by low-banging clouds that cut down visibility. American Sabre Jets. patroled northwest Korean skies but found no Communist MIG-15s.

President Truman has ruled that britain, France and Italy will get continued economic and military aid dispite their shipment of stratagic materials to Communist countries. Mr. Truman said that contracts for the shipments were made before the law was enacted. He also emphasized that none of the deals involved arms, ammunition, implements of war, or atomic energy materials.

Jargeant Romine, aware of the young couple's needs, exclained the situation to the NCCs of the unit. They in turn told their men who took up a collection for the young Korean couple.

The United Press Board of Coaches stood pat on the top five college basketball teams yesterday, rating Illinois and LaSalle 1-2 for the fourth straight week even though both were upset last week.

Kansas State, Washington and Seton Hall, occupying the next three places in that order, all gained ground on the two leaders as the race for national honors tightened.

The 35 leading coaches who make up the UP rating board selected this week's top ten from among the same teams as last week, with a few modifications in placings. Minnesota made the biggest advance among the top ten, jumping from ninth to sixth place. Oklahoma A&M, Indiana, North Carolina State and Holy Cross rounded out the first ten.

UCLA just missed a place among the top ten while Tulsa was 12th and Notre Dame 13th. St. Bonaventure came next, followed by DePaul, Navy, Michigan State, Brisham Young and Fordham. LSU and St. Louis University were tied for the 20th slot.

The stage is set for Australian tennis stars Frank Sedgman and Ken McGregor to make their professional debut in Los Angeles on Tauary 6th followed by a United States tour.

Jack Kramer, the United States professional star, confirmed yesterday he has offered Sedgman a guarantee of \$75,000 and McGregor \$25,000 to make the tour with him and Pancho Segura.
