IN KOREA

An ominous lull settled over the Korean hattlefront. Thursday as near zero, temperatures formed an icy crust on the six inches of snow on the ground, only small probing attacks hit Alliedlines while UN night patrols roamed through the darkness looking for the Communists, Sporadicartillery shells dropped on both sides, of the front.

The lir Force flew more air strikes, smashing frontline positions and supply areas just beyond the battleline. United States Sabre Jets ranged into North Korea through clearing skies but could not find any Johnshist jets to fight. Marine and South Korean fighter-bombers strack targets near the "Funchbowl" on the eastern front while other war planes attacked positions along most of the 155-mile battlefront.
