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IN KOREA

Screaming Allied Thunderjets and Shooting Star fighter-bombers leveled a Red troop and supply center 50 miles from the Manchurian border Sunday while Sabre Jets reported no enemy MIGs willing to fight.

On the ground, the lull in fighting continued as it has since Friday. There was no sign of a major Communist offensive which Red propaganda organs had threatened would begin January 4th.

General Mark W. Clark has decorated Brig. Gen. Robert W. Daniels, his former ordnance officer, with an Oak Leaf cluster in lieu of his second Legion of Merit.

General Daniels is returning to the United States for reassignment after serving as Far East Command Ordnance Officer since November, 1951.

President-elect Dwight Eisenhower has named three assistant attorney generals to become key members of his clean-up team in the Justice Department.

Named as top aids to Attorney General-designate Herbert Brownell, Jr., were Warren Olney III of Berkeley, California, J. Lee Rankin of Lincoln, Nebraska, and Warren E. Burger of St. Paul, Minnesota. All are Republicans. The appointments are subject to Senate confirmation.
