IN KOREA

U.S. jet fighter-bombers swarmed over a Communist troop and supply center only 30 miles from Red China Tuesday and left the sprawling Communist war center a mass of flames, smoke and explosions.

More than 100 warplanes from four fighter-bombers wings hit the target. Dense smoke prevented complete damage evaluation, but preliminary reports revealed that at least 28 billeting and storage buildings were destroyed.

American Sabre Jets damaged two Communist MIGs in aerial duels deep in North Korea.

On the ground, a Red platoon tried to break through Allied defenses on an advanced position west of the Lindung-ni Valley but finally gave up the fight in the face of devastating machine gun, rifle and mortar fire. The action along the front was limited to probing and patrolling.

The election of the next President and Vice-President became official yesterday. The nation's lawmakers met in a joint session in the House chamber and listened as four tellers called off the state by state tally of electoral college votes. Everyone knew what the outcome would be long before yesterday. The official count yesterday confirmed that the GOP ticket won the November 4th election. The score, in electoral votes, was 442 to 89.

Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano was scheduled to leave yesterday for Grossinger, New York, to begin training for his return title fight against former champion Jersey Joe Walcott.

The Marciano-Walcott bout is scheduled for Chicago in late March or early April.
