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BUFFALOES AID ORPHANS HOME

With its share of the 7th Division Yule Fund, the BUFFALO Regiment is assisting UNCAK in enlarging the facilities of a Korean orphanage.

A representative committee consisting of Capt. Charles M. Simpson III, regimental adjutant, Chaplain (Capt.) Donald E. Lewis, regimental chaplain, and M/Sgt. George Sumimoto, "Fox" Company first sergeant, visited the Emanuel Boys Orphanage and presented the director with a check for \$717, the BUFFALOES' share of a Christmas check sent to the "Bayonet" Division by the military and civilian personnel of Fort Jay, Governor's Island, New York.

IN KOREA

The Korean battlefield lapsed into an ominous quiet with only "minor" enemy patrol contacts reported Saturday.

In the air, fighter-bombers rumbled through the night to hit two supply areas northwest of the North Korean capital of Pyongyang. Also hit by the speedy bombers was a marshalling yard near Wonsan on the east coast.

B-26 light bombers trapped 100 enemy trucks on open roads, destroying most of them.

Allied Sabre Jets escaped unscathed for the third straight week while destroying 13 MIGs, probably destroying three and damaging eight. Coupled to one MIG shot down Saturday, it brought the January total to 16 destroyed, three probably destroyed and 18 damaged.

The additional facilities will provide shelter and training for more than 30 homeless shoe shine boys who were found living in the hills.

According to Chaplain Lewis, the men of the regiment decided the manner in which the money was to be spent. "The fellows wanted to help the parentless shine boys. They suggested something like a Korean Boys Town," he said.

Sergeant Sumimoto, chosen to represent the enlisted men of the 17th Regiment because of his 10 months of service in Korea with the BUFFALOES, presented the check to the orphanage director in behalf of his comrades.

"I was surprised and very favorably impressed by all that is being accomplished at the orphanage, and proud that my unit is doing something to aid those boys," said the 27-year-old Infantryman.

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Lt. Col. Norman F. Hines, UNCAK team commander, guided the BUFFALO visitors through the institution and explained how the gift will be used to finance the construction of an additional building which will provide sleeping quarters, a dining hall, and a vocational training classroom.

"Part of the money which the BUFFALO Regiment has given us will be used to purchase hand tools for training our boys," he continued. "Not only do we intend to provide for their educational, spiritual, and recreational needs," said Colonel Hines, "but we want to prepare them for the future by teaching them a trade."

"We are deeply indebted to the BUFFALOES for their assistance."

A capacity crowd of nearly 6,000 saw the smooth volleying Aussie overcome Kramer's "big game" at the Philadelphia Arena Saturday night, 6-4, 10-8.

Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, said yesterday that he had cabled members of the committee in Australia to determine whether it will be necessary to change the site of the 1956 Olympic games.

The games are currently scheduled for Melbourne, Australia.

Brundage said that he cabled members of the OIC and the director of the organizing committee in Australia following a report from an Australian newspaper that its government was not providing sufficient funds for the games.

The games were awarded to Melbourne because no other city in Victoria is equipped for the games. Brundage added that a meeting of the committee on April 17th in Mexico City, will consider changing the site if there is any doubt in the situation at that time.
