has announced that Lt. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor succeed Gen. James. A. Van Fleet as Commanding General, Eighth Army,

General Van Fleet retired effective March 31, 1953, under provisions of the Officer's Personnel Act of 1947, aftermarly 38 years of exceptionally tinguished commissioned service.

General Taylor, the wartime commander of the 101st Airborne Division, has been serving as Deputy Chief of Staff of the De partment of the Army. Prior to his last assignment he served as &ssistant Chief of Staff for Operations G-3; U.S. commander of Berlin and as superintendent of the U.S. military academy at Point.

Six foot 11 inch center Walter Dukes of Seton Hall holds first place among the nation's major individual college basketball scorers.

Dukes has made 501 points in his team's 18 victories, or 27.8 per-game, and has moved ahead of Pennsylvania's Ernie Beck, who has 27.6 points per-game for 11 contests.

It is very for the rare leading scorer to be a member of the top team in the nation. In fact, it happened for the first time last year with Clyde Lovellette and Kansas. But Dukes has been moving at a steady pace and has an excellent chance to match Lovellette's performance.

Behind Dukes and Beck come little Johnny O'Brien of Seattle, with 26.8, Bob Jarvis of Mississippi with 25.5, Bob Houbregs of Washington with 25.3, and Frank Selvy of Furman with points per-game.

The National Football League Rules Committee adopted recommendations for minor rule changes but stood pat on the platoon system and killed suggestions for eliminating the conversion after touchdown and altering
