The ROK Academy will aid materially in the accomplishment of these missions...and is, therefore, truly a United Nations project."

Communist stabs at Allied positions northwest of Yonchon were driven off after a brief engagement yesterday morning. Also on the western front, where the mercury dropped to three below zero, Allied patrols reported four contacts with small enemy units Wednesday night. The action marks the first time the Reds have sent out patrols in the western sector in recent weeks.

Superforts pounded two enemy targets near the North Korean capital in early morning darkness and reported that enemy night fighters had made firing passes.

In addition to Fain, the A's sent rookie second baseman Bob Wilson to Chicago. In return, the White Sox gave up shortstop Joe De Maestri and rookie outfielder Ed McGhee.

Fain led the American League in batting in 1952 with an average of .327 and also was tops in 1951 with .344.

Robinson came to the White Sox May 30, 1950, from Washington in a six-player deal. He batted .296 in 1952.
